19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA,
20	That this act may be cited as the "Comprehensive Homicide Elimination Strategy Task
21	Force Act of 2006".
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23	Sec. 2. Establishment of a Comprehensive Homicide Elimination Strategy Task
24	Force; composition.
25	(a) There is hereby established a Comprehensive Homicide Elimination Strategy
26	Task Force ("Task Force").
27	(b) The Task Force will provide a set of comprehensive policy recommendations
28	on how the District government and non-government partners may
29	accomplish the goal of ending murder in Washington, D.C.
30	(c) The Task Force shall be comprised of the following:
31	(1) One representative from the Office of the Chief of Police;
32	(2) One representative from the Committee on the Judiciary of the Council
33	of the District of Columbia;

1	(3) One representative from the Office of the Deputy Mayor for Justice
2	and Public Safety;
3	(4) One representative from the Office of the Deputy Mayor for Children,
4	Youth and Families;
5	(5) One representative from the Office of the U.S. Attorney;
6	(6) One representative from Court Services and Offender Supervision
7	Agency;
8	(7) One representative from the DC Superior Court;
9	(8) One representative from the D.C. Board of Trade;
10	(9) One representative from the D.C. Chamber of Commerce;
11	(10)One representative from the Federal City Council;
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13	(10) One representative from the DC Parent Teacher Association;
14	(11) One representative from the Office of the Superintendent of DC
15	Public Schools;
16	(12) One representative from the Consortium of Universities of the
17	Washington Metropolitan Area;
18	(13) One representative from the local arts and entertainment
19	community;
20	(14) One representative from the DC Housing Authority;
21	(15) One representative from an organization providing social service to
22	recent immigrants;
23	(16) Two representatives from the mental health/public health field;

1	(17)	Two representatives from the organized faith community;
2	(18)	Two representatives from social service or community
3	en	npowerment groups;
4	(19)	Two representatives from public policy research organizations;
5	(20)	Two representatives from victims' survivors groups;
6	(21)	Two youth representatives, including a current youth participant in
7	the Mayor's Youth Leadership Institute;	
8	(22)	One representative of a local professional sports team;
9	(23)	Two representatives of the media, with one each from a different
10	medium;	
11	(24)	One representative from the philanthropic foundation community;
12	(25)	One representative from organized labor;
13	(26)	One representative of an Advisory Neighborhood Commission;
14	(27)	Two citizen representatives, at least one of which shall be an ex-
15	of	fender.
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17	(d) The Mayo	or with the advice and consent of the Council shall appoint the
18	members	of the Task Force. The Mayor shall transmit to the Council within
19	60 days o	f the effective date of this bill proposed resolutions to approve the
20	appointme	ent of each member of the Task Force for a 45-day period of review,
21	excluding	days of Council recess. If the Council does not approve or
22	disapprov	re a resolution within the 45-day period, the resolution shall be
23	deemed a	pproved.

1	(e) The Mayor shall designate two co-chairs of the Task Force, one each from the
2	government and non-government sector.
3	Sec. 3. Development of the Homicide Elimination strategy.
4	(a) The Task Force shall consider the most effective elements of a comprehensive
5	plan that would lead to the elimination of murder in Washington. In
6	considering such elements, the following goals and policy objectives shall be
7	considered with other elements deemed appropriate when developing the
8	Comprehensive Homicide Elimination strategy:
9	(1) assessing the degree of truancy in all levels of the public schools and
10	determining the best means of achieving its elimination;
11	(2) assessing the adequacy of, and improving, District recreation and
12	community centers and DHS programs (i.e. Strong Families) having
13	specialized social workers who provide wrap-around services to
14	youths and families;
15	(3) assessing the adequacy of, and strengthening, "conflict resolution" and
16	"anger management" curricula in our schools;
17	(4) assessing and improving the District's juvenile justice system with
18	regards to rehabilitation and vocational training for committed youth;
19	(5) removing the barriers to reentry into the job market for adult ex-
20	offenders;
21	(6) assessing the efforts of various non-government groups (i.e. No
22	Murders DC, Reaching Out to Others Together, The Alliance of
23	Concerned Men, Peaceaholics) and the faith-based community to stem

1	violence in the city and, to the extent feasible, government support of,
2	and collaboration with, these efforts;
3	(7) involvement of local businesses and organized labor organizations in
4	providing training, internships and jobs for District youth and adults;
5	(8) assessing the adequacy of the total number of police officers employed
6	by the Metropolitan Police Department, the number and effectiveness
7	of those assigned to "community policing" duties;
8	(9) assessing the adequacy of the laws regarding obstruction of justice and
9	witness tampering;
10	(10) establishment by the Mayor of homicide elimination benchmarks
11	for public safety and other appropriate agencies.
12	(11) Assessing the adequacy of and, if necessary, expanding the
13	availability of, and increasing the funding for, treatment programs for
14	substance abuser, both those who are court-referred and non-court
15	referred.
16	(b) The Comprehensive Homicide Elimination Strategy shall include:
17	(1) The Task Force's findings.
18	(2) Public Policy recommendations, addressing both prevention
19	and enforcement, designed to identify measures and
20	approaches both proactive and reactive which, if taken by the
21	government and non-government partners, would
22	substantially further the goal of eliminating homicides in the
23	District of Columbia.

1	(3) An implementation timetable regarding any and all
2	recommended solutions and/or courses of action and cost
3	estimates for implementing such recommendations.
4	(4) Recommendations regarding where the permanent work of
5	monitoring and facilitating the implementation of a
6	comprehensive plan to end homicide in the District should be
7	housed: with a standing task force; a newly created
8	government entity; an existing government entity; or on a
9	contractual basis by a non-government entity.
10	Sec. 4 . Presentation of Comprehensive Homicide Elimination strategy; public
11	meetings.
12	(a) Within 12 months after the Council's confirmation of the Mayor's
13	nominations to the Task Force, the Task Force shall present the
14	Comprehensive Homicide Elimination Strategy to the Council and the Mayor.
15	(b) The Task Force shall hold at least three public meetings. At least 30 days
16	before a public meeting, the Task Force shall provide the general public the
17	time, date and location of the meeting.
18	(c) Notices shall be sent to all Advisory Neighborhood Commissioners, the
19	Commanders of the seven Police Districts, the Judges of the D.C. Superior Court,
20	the Mayor, and community organizations.
21	(c) The Task Force shall provide all interested persons a reasonable opportunity
22	to be heard at the public meetings.
23	Sec. 5. Reporting requirements; annual report.

1 The Mayor shall report to the Council regarding the implementation of the 2 Comprehensive Homicide Elimination Strategy on an annual basis. 3 Sec. 6. Fiscal impact statement. The Council adopts the fiscal impact statement in 4 the Committee Report as the fiscal impact statement required by section 602(c)(3) of the 5 District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved December 24, 1973 (87 Stat.813; D.C. 6 Official Code Sec. 1-206.02(c)(3)). 7 Sec. 7. Effective date. This act shall take effect following approval by the Mayor 8 (or in the event of veto by the Mayor, action by the Council to override the veto), a 30-9 day period of Congressional review as provided in section 602(c)(1) of the District of 10 Columbia Home Rule Act, approved December 24, 1973 (87 Stat.813; D.C. Official 11 Code Sec. 1-206.02(c)(1)), and publication in the District of Columbia Register. 12
